MILESTONE'S ROCVALE CHILDREN'S HOME SELECTED AS ROCKFORD PRO AM BENEFICIARY

MILESTONE's RocVale
Children's Home was selected from a field of 32 applicants to be one of the beneficiaries of this year's Pro Am Golf



Tournament. The Rockford Pro Am is the nation's longest free standing tournament and each year selects 2 area non profit organizations along with the Junior Golf Course of Greater Rockford to receive grants. 2006 marks the 30th anniversary of the tournament and the 100th anniversary of RocVale Children's Home, making it a significant year for both organizations. For the past 30 years the Rockford Pro Am has been a leader in providing the needed funds to improve healthcare for the area residents, the awarding of this grant will allow Milestone to continue the commitment to

youth that started in 1906 when the Rockford Children's Home, now RocVale, opened its doors. The grant will be used to equip an exercise room at RocVale with recumbent bikes, treadmills, rowing machines and balance and stability aides, using existing space at the facility. This will help our individuals maintain cardiovascular health through exercise when weather prevents them from being able to go outside. WREX Channel 13 will highlight the RocVale project during a special program about the ProAm on the day of the tournament. We also need your help. Volunteers are needed. The tournament is scheduled for July 10 at Forest Hills Country Club and we need 100 volunteers to help with the set up on Saturday July 8 and Sunday July 9 and to work in two concession areas on the 10th. 2006 has already been a busy year for MILESTONE'S Special Olympic Athletes. In January the ROCVALE ROCKERS and the MILESTONE SHOOTERS

Galena and ended with a dance. Jacob brought home a second place medal in downhill skiing and placed 4th in the Giant Slalom. Javier and Luis both received a bronze medal in the snow shoe 50m run. Mira also received a fourth place ribbon in the 50m run.

DENTAL CLINIC HOURS EXPANDED

A limited number of evening appointments are now being offered at the MILESTONE Dental Clinic to meet the needs of working parents. "Because



more of our younger patients are living at home, and because many are coming from the Chicago Suburbs we needed to expand our hours," Dental Director Dr. Jason Grinter explained.

A recent grant from the Illinois Children's Healthcare Foundation helped make the additional hours possible. The MILESTONE Dental Clinic is the only free standing dental clinic in the nation dedicated to serving developmentally disabled children and adults. MILESTONE DENTAL CLINIC STAFF JOINS THE RONALD MCDONALD CARE MOBILE TEAM

Throughout the month of March members of the MILESTONE Dental Clinic staff are joining with health care providers from the Children's Medical Center at Rockford Health System on the Ronald McDonald Care Mobile to provide services to area children. As a result dental care for children with developmental disabilities can be offered during some of the



Care Mobile visits. MILESTONE Dental Clinic staff will also be part of the Care Mobile Team when it returns to the area in June, September and December. The Ronald McDonald Care Mobile is a pediatric clinic on wheels and provides free medical and dental care to uninsured or under insured children who need care. Along with dental care some of the services provided are immunizations, physicals, well child exams and vision screening. The Care Mobile visits locations in Boone, Lee, Ogle, Stephenson and Winnebago counties, and first visited in March of 2003 as a partnership between Rockford Health System and Ronald McDonald Charities. Appointments are needed and can be scheduled by calling 971-5800.

DENTAL CLINIC STAFF TAKE PART IN CRYSTAL LAKE HEALTH FAIR

Over 100 parents of Children with developmental disabilities learned about the services that are available at the MILESTONE Dental Clinic during the second annual Get Connected conference sponsored by Opinions and Advocacy for McHenry County. he decision to place a child with developmental disabilities in a children's home is never an easy one for parents to make. But, they know it's never too early to start planning for their child's future. Sixteen year old Ethan Porzel's parents were told by placement counselors they needed to look towards the future in 2000.

The counselors suggested looking at RocVale Children's Home because of its reputation and the living

could offer their son. The Porzels liked what they saw, and the staff at RocVale felt that Ethan was a perfect match for their program. Renee Porzel, Ethan's mother, says she knows the placement was just meant to be because of the way all the pieces fell into place. Ethan moved into RocVale in January 2001. Both his brother Aaron and his parents appreciate the family atmosphere in the home. His mom says while she knew placement was the right thing to do, in many ways it was like putting her child up for adoption with the

option to visit him every couple of weeks. It was a tough decision to make, but the results have been wonderful. Ethan feels at home at RocVale, and many days after school can be found visiting with the staff or enjoying activities with the other people in his house. He also enjoys his classes and teachers at Page Park School. His parents say while he is happy to have them visit and take him out for spaghetti (his favorite food!), he is always happy to return to RocVale and his family there. While adult placement is a few years in the future for Ethan, his parents hope he will be able to transition into a MILESTONE Group Home.


